### **Issues and Challenges**



#### Interviewers

□ High turnover rate among interviewers - quit for better and more permanent jobs, limited commitment from part-time interviewers -> shortage of interviewers in certain areas/states

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#### Respondents

- Difficulty in gaining trust fear of scams and safety
- □ Refusals did not come from respondents but from other members of the family
- □ Language barrier between interviewers and respondents

### Movement restrictions

□ COVID-19 pandemic - travel restriction issue, fear of physical meeting

### Low response rate

Among specific sub-groups and communities (Example: urban Chinese, gated residential areas)

### Addresses no longer valid

□ New development – e.g. shopping mall

### Remote areas with limited accessibility


Limited access to some of the remote areas, especially in East Malaysia

### Representativeness of the population

Under representation of certain subgroups (e.g. Chinese ethnic group)



# **Strategies to Increase Survey Response Rate**



### **Several remedial measures**



#### Fieldwork planning

- » Interviewers travel in teams of 3-5 people working for 3-7 days, particularly in the very remote areas
- » Matching interviewers to respondents in terms of background such as ethnicity, language/dialect and religion.
- » Promotion of MARS project through various local media.
- » Establishing network with local community leaders to increase cooperation from respondents.
- Real-time fieldwork monitoring
  - » To ensure interviewers are compliant with the interview protocols
- Continuous recruitment of interviewers
  - » Continuous recruitment and training of interviewers to address the high turnover rate.

#### Phone interviews during the movement restrictions

- » Phone interviews were carried out followed by physical measurements on site once restrictions were lifted.
- Use of weights
  - » Weights were calculated to cater for under/over representation of certain subgroups.
